

# The Reed College Herbarium

It is not generally known to the Reed community that there is a small herbarium at this school. It not only houses vouchers from student theses and in all probability contains many other specimens, but it is growing numerically as new species are collected. This note will briefly describe the herbarium. A few notable varieties will be mentioned.

The herbarium consists of two sections, 1) the old section and 2) the new section. The old section contains about 1,000 specimens. Nearly all of these are old specimens date from the end of the last century, though now we obtained these valuable species from collectors unknown. A number of specimens brought to the herbarium by Mr. C. W. Cusick, collector of plants in Eastern Oregon, and Mr. L. E. Hora, are represented. Identifiable Arctotis lanata are few. The species *A. lanata* and *A. microcephala* are perhaps the most common. In the new section, *Arctotis lanata* is sparsely represented. Many species collected by Dr. G. C. Constance, Dr. S. J. Lovell, and Dr. R. C. H. Smith, etc., are included even a very few species. A number of *Urtica dioica* are present.

The other specimens are more recent ones and so rather valuable historically. Most of the bulk of the collection comes from the collection of Mr. L. J. Linzey's collection of the Northwest floras in mountain areas (the Wenatchee, Wenatchee River, Columbia River, etc.). The rest of the herbarium is probably as follows: A number of lists have been prepared, some for their value in identification, others for their versatility or interesting locality, or for their value on the Reed campus. Some of the species are: *Agave*, *Bromus*, *Carex*, *Margyricarpus*, *Malus*, *Populus*, *Rubus*, which are only a few. In the herbarium, *Urtica dioica* is the most abundant. At the present time the herbarium is being given certain aid in serving as the herbarium of the University of the Cascades, Prineville (Lincoln Co., Oregon). The herbarium is in Room P2500A, Ridge Publishing.

We are extremely grateful to Mr. Linzey for his collection. We also thank him for his help in the preparation of this note.

A new addition to the collections is made up of a number of fine species collected by P. Evans.
